


The Muslim Youth mini bus toured the area while donating books to all of the Riverland libraries.




## THE BAD MOTHERS' BOOK CLUB

The book is advertised as


Australian as a lamb roast!


### FROM THE MANAGER'S DESK cont.....



### **BOOK REVIEW**



### **Any Ordinary Day**

by Leigh Sales

ABC 7:30 host and journalist Leigh Sales deals with reporting on out of the ordinary occurrences such as disasters, floods and other tragedies that lead to near death experiences, or even actual death, on a daily basis, it is part of her professional life. Watching these tragedies occur, as well as suffering her own near death experience whilst giving birth to her second child has prompted her to write this book. She questions the likelihood of certain events occurring as well as how the human brain copes with these things.

To prepare for the task of writing she enlisted the services of a friend who is a research librarian to provide her with access to articles on a wide range of topics such as trauma, grief, adaptation, blame, memory and survival. She uses information and statistics gleaned from her research to make a point and add real interest to her writing. She shares with us the likelihood (or probability) of survivor Louisa Hope of being diagnosed with multiple sclerosis as well as experiencing the Lindt Café siege (one in 1.39 billion) as well as the chances of Stuart Diver being widowed a third time (it is more likely that he will pass away first).

The most interesting aspect of her writing is her interviews with people who have suffered some form of tragedy or loss such as Stuart Diver and Walter Mikac (who lost his entire family in the Pt. Arthur Massacre) as well as those whose job it is to be in the midst of a crisis such as a social worker, a police officer, a priest and even a prime minister. There's an interesting interview with former Prime Minister John Howard who is our second-longest-serving prime minister; during his tenure there was an unusual series of mass-fatality events.

(Such as the Black Hawk helicopter crash, the Thredbo landslide, 9/11 Twin Towers incident and the Bali bombings.) As prime minister, Howard felt that he needed to address the public to try and unify Australians after each of the tragedies. He often spoke from the heart and off the cuff in an effort to comfort Australians. It is probably for these reasons that he was the only government person formally invited to attend the twentieth anniversary of the Port Arthur massacre.

Sales also touches on religion and ponders whether having religious beliefs allows you to re-adjust to life better after a tragedy. She is critical of the way she has conducted interviews in the past, especially her coverage of Hurricane Katrina, for which she received Australia's highest journalism honour, a Walkley Award.



This is a work of non-fiction that proved to be so enthralling that I have now made a decision to read non-fiction on a more regular basis.
